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# Executive Summary

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## ***District Strategic Plan 2025***

Orange County Public Schools is the ninth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

**Vision:** To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

**Mission:** With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

## ***School Collection Development Plan***

Lake Nona High School serves 4357 students enrolled in ninth through twelfth grades. The student population's ethnicity is made up of 61% Hispanic and 39% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 81% White, 10% Black, 0% Native, 6% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 2% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Nikki Campbell and Assistant Principal Wilicia Hughes. Lake Nona High School is proud to offer many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Advanced Placement courses; a Dual Enrollment program; Latinos in Action; a thriving arts program; Student Government Association; an award winning Debate program; and extracurriculars that include NHS, BETA, Key Club, African American Culture Club, Gay Straight Alliance, QStem, Asian American Club, Art NHS, French NHS, chess club, Actions 4 Animals, and a criminology club.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Lake Nona High School indicates that the average age of the collection is 2004 and the number of books per student is 5. The American Association for School Libraries has established a criteria for a highly effective media center that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Lake Nona High School does not meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Library circulation is up at least 70% since 2020.
- Our 20-21 FSA Reading performance increased in 21-22.
- Our "Aged titles" need to be weeded-the average age is 1999 and the aged titles are 57% of the collection.
- Evaluate the age of the graphic novel collection and differentiate the manga from the graphic novels.

- The average age of the collection is 2004, I would like to raise that to at least the district average of 2007 or even 2010.
- Work to increase the SEL age and the Diversity pub ages from 2004 to 2007 or younger.
- My priority for selections this year are to increase LatinX/Hispanic representation and mental health representation.
- My priority for weeding is to remove titles that have not been checked out in the last five years and to remove aged titles from non-fiction 000-400.
- I am also seeking to include more student input in the titles and genres available in the media center.

### Notes

- Translation dictionaries-some are listed in language and some in reference. I would like to standardize how they are cataloged.
- I would like to increase the number and variety of texts available in the language section. Some could also be resources for our ELL teachers as well as students.
- The collection overall is much older than is appropriate for our population.
- The biographies need to be updated and reflective of who the students want to read about.
- The books on technology are far outdated and the most current information regarding technology would be better found by using the databases we subscribe to.

## Representation Analysis

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To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

### ***Results***

Based on the available school data of Lake Nona High School in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:

After completing a deeper, targeted analysis of the representation section of the TitleWise report, it was determined that:

- I will work to increase the age and scope of my African American titles.
- I will work to increase the percentage of books that address or include mental health as a focus or story arc.
- I will work to increase the percentage of books that represent our LBGTQ+ school community.
- I will work to increase the LatinX/Hispanic representation in the collection overall-fiction and nonfiction.
