Diploma Designations

Scholar Diploma Designation

In addition to meeting the 24-credit standard high school diploma requirements, a student must meet all of the following requirements:

- Earn 1 credit in Algebra 2 or an equally rigorous course
- Pass the Geometry EOC
- Earn 1 credit in Statistics or an equally rigorous mathematics course

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- High school years are **cumulative** – meaning everything done from the start of 9th grade (or if students took high school classes while in middle school) till the end of 12th grade counts!!! Therefore, students should consider what they want their final outcome for high school to be and be working on it now.

Grades/GPA have an effect on my participation in other campus activities.

Procedure for unpaid Service Hours

- Once complete turn in the completed form with Student, Parent and Site Supervisor Signature and Reflection

Procedure for Paid Hours

- Secure a place of employment
- Obtain the Community Service Form
- Work 100 hours keeping track on your pay stubs showing number of hours worked
- Once you have obtained 100 paid hours turn in paystubs along with a reflection of your time and Student and Parent Signature

STANDARDIZED TEST

- PSAT (Practice SAT)
 - 9th, 10th, and 11th grade students take this test in October
 - 11th grade students should take the test to try to score high enough to qualify for certain scholarship programs
- SAT (College Admissions test)
 - Should take starting in 11th grade
 - 2 sections (Evidence Based Reading/Writing and Mathematics)
 - Free practice available: www.khanacademy.org/sat
- ACT (College Admissions test)
 - Should take starting in 11th grade
 - 4 sections (English, Mathematics, Reading, & Science) plus an optional Writing section (Writing section may be required by some colleges)
 - Highest Score is a 36
 - Beginning September 2020, you can just take specific sections

Pros and Cons of Dual-Enrollment (on track to graduate with an AA)

Pros

- For in-state institutions, it can shorten the time to complete undergraduate degree.
- Students have experience with college scheduling and classes while in high school.
- Save money towards earning a degree.
- Ability to satisfy high school requirements as well as AA degree requirements.

Cons

- There is no guarantee all credits will count towards your intended degree. It is up to the institution to decide how many credits they will accept.
- Can cause issues with future employment if the student is too young and has no job experience.
- A major must be declared once student starts college. If student is unsure of what they want to study, this can cause issues for them.
- Dual Enrollment is NOT a direct connect to any institution. Students must still apply to the college as a first time college student, not a transfer student.

AP Classes vs. Dual Enrollment

AP Classes

- Colleges tend to award credit more easily based on AP test scores (typically 3 or higher)
- Academically challenging classes
- Out-of-state universities tend to look more favorably on AP classes because the curriculum is familiar
- Helps increase weighted GPA.
- No guaranteed college credit will be awarded by passing the class, student must achieve the required test score

Dual Enrollment

- Students have experience with a college setting while in high school.
- Save money towards earning a degree.
- Helps increase the weighted GPA.
- The student is the only one that can advocate for him or herself. Parents must be “hands off”.
- More variety of classes.
- Students are able to experience different campuses.

Industry Certification

Industry certification is a credential that documents the level of technical skill mastery an individual has achieved. Each field has a specific certification that is recognized throughout that industry for specific technical skills.

Dual Enrollment at OTC

Dual Enrollment is a program that allows you to take courses at Orange Technical College while still enrolled in your high school. High school students who are in grades 11 and 12 may attend a campus for a half-day and earn elective credits to obtain a career.

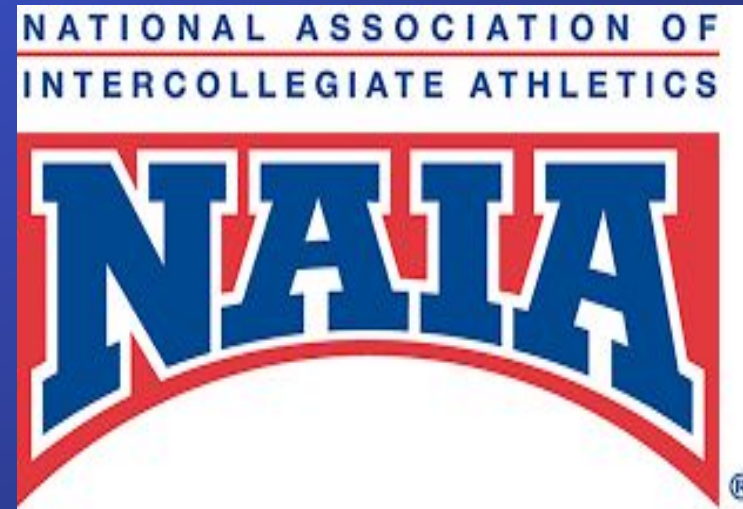

CURRENT POST-SECONDARY PLAN:

Online Course Requirement

Students must take at least one online high school course and complete it with a passing grade in order to meet the online course graduation requirement. One entire course means that if the course is one whole credit (example, HOPE), the student must successfully complete both semesters. If the course is only half a credit (example, Personal and Family Finance), the student must successfully complete the semester in order to fulfill the online course requirement.

Directions for signing up for an online course

- Go to FLVS.net
- Click "Enroll"
- Click "County Virtual School Grades 6-12" then "Enroll" again.
- Click "I live in Florida"
- Click "Orange County"
- Click "Public/Charter School Student" and "Continue"
- Select the course you are interested in taking
 - Select the Segment/Semester (remember, if the course is one whole credit, you must select and complete both segments/semesters)
 - Select the Virtual School you prefer, either Florida Virtual (statewide) or Orange County Virtual (taught by Orange County Public Schools teachers who are more accessible)
 - Select your preferred start date [you can select a date in the future - for example, you can select the first day of summer] and click "Continue"
 - Select your reason for taking the course (most likely to "Satisfy online course graduation requirement" and select that the "No, this is not on my class schedule" and how you heard about FLVS.net and click "Continue"
 - Click "Create My Account" and answer all of the Sign Up questions. At the end of the registration, you will receive your username and password. Keep your username and password in a secure location in case you forget.
 - Once you have completed your registration and signed up for your course, your counselor will be able to approve your course selection. Remember to check your account frequently (approximately twice a week) to see when a teacher has been assigned to you. Once you have been assigned a teacher, you will be required to contact your teacher before you may begin your class.

Incoming 9th Grade Students:

If you will be taking a course over the summer, please request that course with a start date of the first day of summer, and your middle school counselor will approve it.

After the last day of school, you will need to transfer your account to Lake Nona High School:

- Log in, access your dashboard and click on the menu (upper left-hand side)

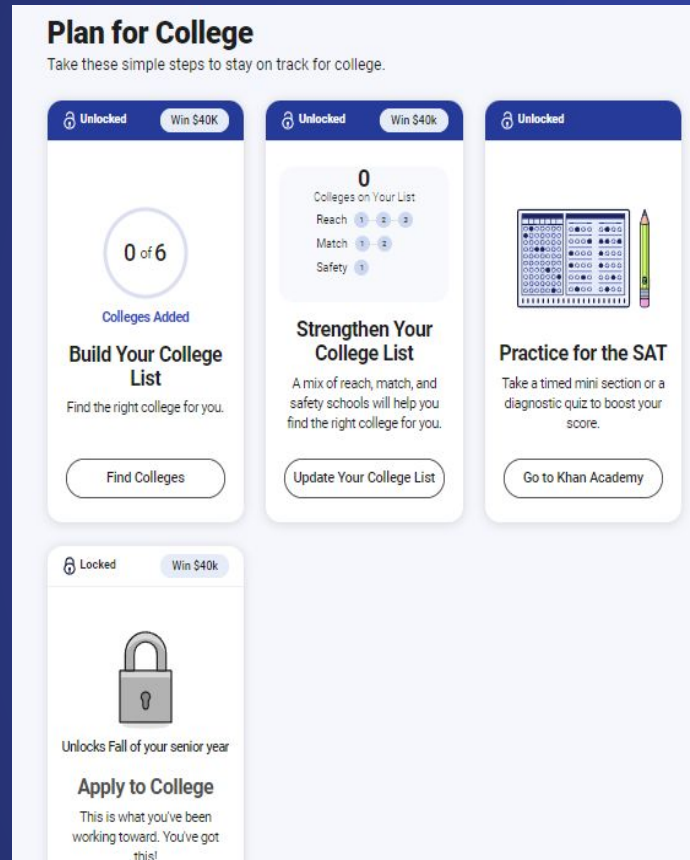
